

Matthew R. Shay

Matthew Shay is president and CEO of the National Retail Federation, the world's largest retail trade association. He serves as chief advocate and spokesman for the nation's largest privatesector industry employer, responsible for creating one in four U.S. jobs – 42 million working Americans, generating \$2.6 trillion in annual GDP.

Since 2010, Shay has transformed NRF into Washington's most powerful voice supporting the retail industry, leading the organization to new levels of effectiveness on policy issues, increasing awareness of the industry's economic impact and expanding political engagement. Under his tenure, membership has more than doubled to 18,000, revenue has doubled and advocacy investments have grown significantly.

Shay's implementation of a new strategic plan for the organization, allocating new financial and human resources to government relations and advocacy, a new approach to communications and public affairs has lead to legislative movement on patent litigation reform, sales tax fairness, data security; the creation of the This is Retail industry perception campaign; NRF's most successful Annual Convention in it's 100 year history and the expansion of the NRF Foundation which awarded over \$1million in educational scholarships last vear alone.



Shay previously served as president and CEO of the International Franchise Association, which represents more than 1,200 franchise companies in retail and other industries around the world. Shay has been recognised by CEO Update as one of the top 50 nonprofit chief executives in Washington. He serves on a number of boards and committees including the American Society of Association Executives, Good360, So Others Might Eat, the U.S. Capitol Historical Society, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Association Committee of 100 and the U.S. Chamber of

He is a graduate of Wittenberg University Springfield, Ohio, the Ohio State University College of Law, and holds a master's degree in business administration from the Georgetown University McDonough School of Business. He also holds an honorary doctor of humane letters from Wittenberg University and an honorary degree of professional designation in merchandise marketing from the Fashion Institute of Design and Merchandising.

Megyn Kelly

Megyn Kelly serves as anchor of FOX News Channel's (FNC), The Kelly File (weekdays 9-10pm/ET) and is based in New York. She joined the network in 2004 as a Washington-based correspondent

Ranked as the number two program in cable news, The Kelly File focuses on late-breaking stories as

well as in-depth investigative reports along with newsmaker interviews. The program capitalizes on Kelly's skills as a former litigator and provides a platform to discuss developing angles as events unfold, while embracing a stronger social media presence. Previously, Kelly anchored her own two-hour solo program, America Live, and co-anchored America's Newsroom with Bill Hemmer (weekdays 9-11 AM/ET)

During the 2012 and 2014 political seasons, Kelly served as coanchor of FNC's America's Election HQ alongside Bret Baier. FNC was the top rated cable news channel on midterm election night 2014, (Nielsen) averaging 6.6 million viewers and besting three cable networks for the first time ever. In 2012, the network's election night coverage delivered a record-breaking 12 million viewers and finished first among cable news and only second among broadcast. Kelly contributed to the network's coverage of the 2008 presidential election and 2010 midterm election.

With FNC, Kelly has covered breaking news and reported live from numerous political events. Some of the major stories she's covered include, the 2013 government shutdown, the Boston

Marathon bombing, the election of Pope Francis, the shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, C.T., coverage of the deadly EF5 tornado in Joplin, M.O and the 2010 Deepwater Horizon oil spill. Previously she reported from Blacksburg, V.A. on the Virginia Tech campus massacre and from Durham, N.C., the Duke University rape case involving three of the school's lacrosse players and broke new details that would ultimately help exonerate the defendants.

During her role as a correspondent, Kelly provided coverage of the confirmation hearings for U.S. Supreme Court Justice Samuel A. Alito Jr. and Chief Justice John Roberts. In 2009/2010, she co-hosted FNC's coverage of the confirmation hearings of Justices Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan. Before joining FNC Kelly reported the 2004 presidential race and D.C. snipper case with WJLA-TV (ABC7).

Prior to her career in television news, Kelly practiced law as a corporate litigator at Jones Day for nine years and was an associate in the Chicago office of the law firm Bickel & Brewer LLP. In 2014, Kelly was listed as one of TIME magazine's 100 most influential people in the world. She earned her B.A. in Political Science from Syracuse University and a J.D. from Albany Law School, where she graduated with honors and served as editor of the Albany Law Review.
